ceiling. A Lionel train, too! Then we opened the presents from our parents--another electric train. Ho hum. And not nearly as extravagant as the one from our cousin. Guess whose we played with most?

Mom and Dad were hurt. The outlay for an unmarried Air Force lieutenant was nothing compared to the sacrifice my parents had made. But all we saw was the glamour of an expensive train. We counted our parents' gift as merely a nice accessory.

"For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not perish but may have eternal life" (John 3:16).



The First Christmas Card

A prominent educator and patron of the arts, Henry Cole travelled in the elite, social circles of early Victorian England, and had the misfortune of having too many friends. During the 1843 holiday season, those friends were causing Cole much anxiety due to their letters. An old custom in England, the Christmas and New Year's letter had received a new impetus with the recent expansion of the British postal system and the introduction of the "Penny Post".

As Cole watched the stacks of unanswered correspondence he fretted over what to do. It was considered impolite not to answer mail. Then he hit on an idea. He approached an artist friend, J.C. Horsley, and asked him to design the idea that Cole had sketched out in his mind. Cole then took Horsley's illustration and had a thousand copies made by a London printer on a piece of stiff cardboard 5 1/8 x 3 1/4 inches in size. At the top of each was the salutation, "TO:____" allowing Cole to personalize his responses, which included the generic greeting "A Merry Christmas and A Happy New Year To You." It was the first Christmas card.
